





It is rightly observed that the Bible is not a book, but a book of books. In the same way theology and religious studies is not a discipline, but a discipline of disciplines


Disciplinary Lenses

Here are some examples of how these "Ways of Knowing" can be applied in RE lessons:

Pupils could use a philosophical "lens" to explore ethical issues raised by different religions, considering the arguments for and against various positions.

Pupils could use a social science "lens" to explore the role of religion in shaping cultural traditions, such as religious festivals or community events.


