TATER DU NEWS!

It's been so wonderful to welcome Tater Du back into school for the second part of the Spring Term. The children have settled brilliantly and have got stuck straight into their learning.

- We worked together to plan our new topic 'Come Outside'. The children have talked about what they would like to learn about and the types of activities that they would like to carry out over the next few weeks.
- In our maths, we have been learning all about odd and even numbers and doubling. We are now looking briefly at length and time before deepening our knowledge of numbers 9 and 10.
- We have been focusing on the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk' in our Drawing Club activities. We also planted our own runner beans and created castles in the clouds for our beanstalks to grow up to.
- We have started our incubation project. Last week we put 8 eggs into the incubator and on Tuesday we candled them for the first time. We are so excited that we currently have eggs that are growing chicks. We're keeping everything crossed for a successful hatch rate.
- Last week, we found a large stick insect in the school playground. We brought it in, named it 'Sticky' and have been observing and learning lots of stick insect facts.

Reading at home:

It is recommended that children read a minimum of 3 times over the course of the week and everything that you do, no matter how big or small, really does have a HUGE impact on what your child is able to achieve in all areas of their learning. SEVENSTONES

Welcome back to Spring Term 2. We hope you have been enjoying the wonderful weather that March has brought us—long may it continue!

What have we been up to?

• We have been reading a book called 'Pebble in my pocket'. This is explaining the rock cycle. The children have been fascinated with how old rocks actually are! They have written some super explanations.

• In science, we've been looking at everything 'rock' related. We've been looking at how rocks were formed and the three types of rocks—igneous, sedimentary and metamorphic.

• In geography, we have started looking at natural disasters. We looked at what's beneath our feet then discussed how volcanoes were formed.

During the last two weeks we have also had many enrichment activities including: watching the Elmore String Quartet, doing a farming to food workshop with a lady from Royal Cornwall Showground, taking part in the St Piran's day parade and dressing up as a book character for World Book Day! Jam packed!

<u> Bishop Rock – Year 4</u>

In science, we planned and carried out an investigation to find out the melting point of chocolate linked to our learning on the three states of matter: solids, liquids and gases.

We began by looking at the key words - melting and freezing – and then talked about independent and dependent variables before carrying out our investigation. It took a lot of will-power to resist actually eating the chocolate!

In history, we have continued to look at the relationship between the Anglo-Saxons and Vikings, particularly their achievements and society structures, comparing these to our society today. This week, we learnt about how despite time moving forwards, Saxon and Vikings houses regressed from the Villas lived in by the Romans. In geography, we have learnt about the four regions and landforms of Europe focussing on key geographical terms such as elevation, uplands, lowlands and alpine. This week we started to compare Iceland and the United Kingdom in terms of their physical features and climate.

In RE, we have continued to learn about how Hindus worship as part of their daily routines. While in PE, we have explored counter balances and how to fluently link different balances together.

In mathematics, we have been exploring both informal and formal methods for multiplication, tackling fluency, reasoning and problem-solving tasks.

Finally, in English we have been writing Norse stories linked to our history learning about the Vikings.



Godrevy

Ever considered Greece as your next holiday destination? If you need any convincing, Godrevy class has been busy creating fantastic holiday brochures! Building on our previous geography lessons about the Greek and Hebridean islands, the children have written, edited, and designed brochures using iPads. I can't wait to see the finished versions—and I'm sure I'll be easily persuaded to visit a Greek island!

In science, we kicked off our new topic by revisiting what we already know about materials. The children took part in an exciting experiment featuring "dancing raisins"! But what made them appear to dance? Using key terms like "solids," "liquids," and "gases," they observed how lemonade caused the raisins to move up and down in the cup, leading to some great discussions and discoveries.

We also wrapped up our final 'Schools Across the Ocean Project' Zoom call, connecting with schools from the UAE, Azerbaijan, and England. The children explored the impact of fire—how it can be both destructive and beneficial and shared three positive things happening in the environment today. Looking ahead, we're excited for more science, including a trip to Cape for a quiz, diving into our Plague Playscript in writing lessons, and exploring the Hip Hop genre—learning the beat, lyrics, and history of 'The Fresh Prince of Bel- Air'

Wolf Rock

Wolf Rock Class took great pride in leading the St Just Primary School contingent in the St. Piran's Day parade on Wednesday. Our dancing footwork wasn't always perfect, but it was lovely to see how smiley and joyful they all were out and about in the glorious March sunshine.

Back in the classroom, our new topic is the World War II themed 'Battles, Bombs & Bravery'. The wartime theme is running through much of our learning. In English we are reading 'Carrie's War', a novel that has just celebrated its 50th anniversary, and as such is providing the children with some unusual turns of phrase as well as some different snippets of Welsh dialect. The children have been reflecting on the similarities and differences of the wartime evacuation and the COVID restrictions that they experienced themselves a few years ago.

With code breaking such an important part of the war, our maths focus has turned to algebra. So far we have learnt to use one and 2-step function machines, form expressions, substitution, formulae, form equations and how to solve 1-step equations. We've been very impressed with how well the children are progressing with it, and we hope they are discussing what they're learning with you as it goes a long way to helping them commit it to memory, so please keep quizzing them on their homework videos.



Our history lessons are pulling from these other subjects as well as introducing much of the key understanding required about World War II. Over the topic we will be learning about the key events that caused the war, the 'when' 'where' and 'whys' of the evacuation programme, rationing and how it impacted diets; how women played an important and significant role in the war, the Holocaust, the chronology and significance of key events throughout WWII and finally reflecting on why The Battle of Britain was a significant turning point in British history.

We were delighted not to see a single piece of school uniform in the class when we celebrated World Book Day on Thursday, with everybody dressing differently to mark the occasion. The theme for our reading carousel was for each teacher to pick a book they fondly remembered from their own childhood – it's fair to say there were a lot of archaic texts! It was lovely to see how broadly the year 6's spread themselves, making for some very rich book talk when we came back together.
